Executive Summary

The Sentinel Violence Intelligence Command Program is a full agency-level training and intelligence development package for departments facing gang violence, repeat violent offenders, narcotics-driven violence, hybrid groups, juvenile offenders, and fragmented intelligence sharing.

This program is designed to move an agency beyond isolated training events and toward a coordinated violence intelligence model. Command staff is often forced to make decisions after the damage is already done.

The weakness is usually not effort. The weakness is fragmentation. This program is built to close that gap.

Program Architecture

The program is structured as a high-level agency package, not a single topic class. Each component is designed to build on the others so the agency leaves with training, templates, shared terminology, and a practical implementation path.

1. Pre-Training Agency Assessment

Review of gang trends, violent crime patterns, intelligence gaps, repeat offender issues, narcotics-related violence, and current enforcement concerns.

2. Two-Day Command-Level Training

For supervisors, investigators, patrol leadership, jail intelligence personnel, command staff, and prosecutors when available.

3. Two-Day Practitioner Training

For patrol, gang, narcotics, jail, probation/parole, violent crime investigators, task force officers, and field personnel.

4. Policy and Documentation Templates

Practical tools for gang documentation, intelligence collection, social media preservation, officer safety indicators, interview admissions, and report writing.

5. Case-Study Workshop

Agency personnel bring real local problems into a guided working session focused on targets, associations, intelligence collection, constitutional guardrails, and prosecution readiness.

6. Thirty-Day Implementation Follow-Up

One virtual follow-up session with command staff, investigators, and selected personnel to review progress and refine the agency strategy.

7. Custom After-Action Report

A written summary of training, major gaps identified, recommendations, and practical next steps for leadership planning and grant justification.

Audience and Subject Matter Expert Model

The program is designed for department-wide participation because violent crime intelligence is not owned by one unit. The best results come when personnel from multiple functions learn the same indicators, documentation standards, and intelligence-sharing expectations.

- Interview admissions and documentation of gang membership or association
- Social media indicators and responsible evidence preservation
- Music, lyrics, videos, and online behavior as investigative leads
- Narcotics, weapons, robberies, debt collection, and retaliation patterns
- Jail intelligence, prison affiliations, and street-to-custody intelligence flow
- Report writing language that supports investigation and prosecution

Documentation Tools and Agency Templates

Training without tools fades. This program includes practical templates designed to help personnel document information consistently, preserve intelligence value, and support stronger investigative and prosecution decisions.
